

Veterans Benefits Workshop It's Finally A Wrap. by Jim Parker

About two years ago then Dist. 19 Commander George Miller had an idea for a workshop to help Illinois veterans really understand the benefits to which they were entitled. He contacted his good friend Dutch DeGroot and asked him to chair the planning committee for the workshop. DeGroot had many irons in the fire at that time. He was the Service Officer and Adjutant of Post 1337 and the Service Officer of the 4th District. His busy schedule notwithstanding, DeGroot agreed to take on the committee leadership position. He recognized at once that to make the workshop special and to attract attendees he needed to have a truly outstanding group of presenters who could speak knowledgeably and effectively on subjects that were current and important to vets. He knew from the beginning that he had to have Barry Walter, the Past Director of the VFW Service Office of Illinois and a current VSO for the Department of Michigan. Mr. Walter quickly agreed to speak at the event. Steve Fixler, the Superintendent of the Veterans Assistance Commission of DuPage County volunteered to help fill out the list of presenters. In short order they assembled a group of the "pro's pros" to participate. Meanwhile, Mr. Miller secured the assistance of then Jr. Vice Commander of the 19th District, Brett Nila, and Jay Davis, the Commander of Post 1197 in Batavia. Davis

secured the approval of his Post to host the event at their large Post HQ building. Other volunteers signed on, including many from Post 1197 and Post 1337, and DeGroot's committee set about their work. Issues came up and were addressed, a date was set in March 2020, an informational flyer was prepared and distributed throughout the State, and veterans were registering to attend. Then came Covid. The March date had to be cancelled as well as the next set date in May. By now the seriousness of the pandemic had become apparent to all. Despite that, the committee still believed in the value of the workshop and met regularly (via Zoom) to address the many issues raised by the disease and the delays that accompanied it. All the while the committee kept up planning for seating, audiovisual, meals, beverages, and the many other necessary components of their ambitions program. They stayed at it until they were able to set a final date. By Saturday morning on October 2 everything was in place. Most of the presenters and committee members remained dedicated to the program and the veterans who had registered. Incredibly, despite almost two years of unavoidable delays, only five of the 180+ veterans who paid to attend had withdrawn and requested the return of their payments. But, in the end, it was worth the wait.

At its most recent regular meeting Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 1337 of Mount Prospect an American Legion Post 525 welcomed two new honorary members. Commander Les Durov presented Certificates of Honorary Membership to a pair of distinguished veterans who, since completion of their active duty, have lent their considerable talents to assisting fellow veterans and veteran organizations. These two remarkable individuals are Andrew Tangen, currently the Superintendent of the Veterans Assistance Commission of Lake County, Illinois, and Timothy Delany, presently employed by Humana Inc. as it Veterans Community Engagement Executive for the States of Illinois, Iowa and Wisconsin.

Mr. Tangen is a US Navy veteran who rose to the rank of Lt. Commander. During his military service Mr. Tangen, whose primary assignments were in support of Counterintelligence and Counterterrorism, was deployed many times including assignments in the Middle East, Afghanistan, Central and South America and Europe. In his current position, he represents veterans in claims involving the VA. At the meeting Mr. Tangen also received a Certificate of Merit marking his achievement of the Boy Scout rank of Eagle Scout in 2000.

Tim Delaney served in the US Army and retired after 25 years of service holding the rank of Sgt. First Class. In his long career Mr. Delany also was deployed many times to the Middle East and Afghanistan. Recently, Mr. Delaney has been instrumental in helping Post 1337 obtain volunteer help and financial assistance of Humana Inc. in connection with many of its projects and programs.

Mr. Delaney and Mr. Tangen are both regular members of other VFW posts but Post 1337 is proud to include each of them as Honorary Members.

Mount Prospect Police Officer Presented with VFW State of Illinois Law Enforcement Public Servant of the Award

At its State convention this past June in Springfield the Veterans of Foreign Wars Department of Illinois named Mount Prospect Patrol Officer Stevan Sparr as the winner of its Law Enforcement Public Servant of the Year for 2020-2021. Officer Sparr was nominated for this prestigious honor by Mount Prospect VFW Post 1337. Post Commander, Les Durov, presented the award to Officer Sparr at a recent meeting of the Village Board meeting. Other officers and members of the Post also were in attendance along with Chief John Koziol and Mayor Paul Hoefert. The award is made annually by the Department of Illinois as part of a program developed and sponsored by the national organization of the VFW.

After receiving a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice from Winona State University in Minnesota and graduating from the Cook County Sherriff's Police Academy, Officer Sparr began his 21-year career with the MPPD in 1999. His job title was Patrol Office an as such his duties included (and continue to include) foot and vehicle patrols and responding to calls for service. In addition to enforcing Illinois laws and Village Ordinances Officer Sparr says he endeavors to "foster and maintain community relations with the citizens I serve." In 2018 he was assigned the additional duties of a Field Training Officer. As such he is responsibly for training and mentoring probationary police officers to prepare them for a career with the MPPD. In 2015 Office Sparr found away to incorporate

his police duties with a life long passion – a love of animals and his commitment to animal rescue. He suggested to his Department that a Department Facebook page be created to help reunite lost and found pets with their owners. The MPPD agreed and since 2016 Officer Sparr has been the Administrator of the Village of Mount Prospect Lost and Found Pets Program, which is his personal creation. Since then the page has been expanded to include the placement of stray animals with appropriate shelters and rescue agencies. The publication also includes information about Village Ordinances regarding animals. Today the Facebook page has over 1800 followers from all over the area. It has helped reunite about 150 family pets with their owners and has assisted in the rescue of dozens of stray, abused and neglected animals. Office Sparr is the proud owner of two previously neglected or abused dogs.

Officer Sparr's resume includes two Honorable Mention Awards and two Exceptional Performance Awards. Chief Koziol describes Officer Sparr as having "an excellent work ethic and a strong set of personal and professional values" which make him "an important valued member of member of this Department." VFW Post 1337 is honored to salute this talented, dedicated and brave police officer who helps make Mount Prospect a better place to work and live by keeping it safe.

Local Veterans Broadcast Veterans Day Program From Mount Prospect.

On November 11, 2021, Veteran's Day, Mount Prospect Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 1337 and American Legion Post 525 broadcasted a virtual Veterans Day program for the second time from the Village Board Chambers using the facilities of Mount Prospect's Comcast Channel 17. Several veterans attended the live program, which included some pre-recorded portions. The program remains available on You Tube via this link: https://youtu.be/19thy-77TFY. This event was quite different from prior years when members of our local Posts visited many area schools in small groups. The students, faculties and staff of these schools liked hearing about the holiday from actual veterans. For the vet's part, they always enjoyed interacting with children — telling stories about their service and answering questions. In person meetings like this were not possible this year and last year due to the Covid-19 pandemic so the idea of a virtual program was born. Post 1337 Commander, Les Durov and Post 525 Commander, Bill Starr, invited local school districts and many area parochial schools to participate in the program. Many schools choose to do so by making it available for viewing by students through the schools' AV facilities or by contributing portions of the program itself.

Commander Starr (who acted as the Master of Ceremonies) opened the celebration by thanking Mayor Paul Hoefert and the veterans in attendance. He noted that American armed forces are equipped with the best ships, airplanes and other military hardware available anywhere on the planet. But, he pointed out that this equipment would be useless without the volunteers who choose to join the American armed forces and who operate it. These are the brave men and women who protect our nation and enable us to enjoy its freedoms. They are the reason we celebrate Veterans Day every year.

Commander Durov then led everyone in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance. That was followed by a pre-recorded rendition of the National Anthem by the MacArthur School Chorus. After the Invocation by Pastor Christie Webb of St. Mark's Lutheran Church, Commander Starr introduced Makala Schmitt and Alaina Costello, two students from MacArthur Middle School who read an essay, the Origins of Veterans Day. Next, Commander Starr asked everyone to join in with vocalist Delaney Nold, a senior at Prospect High School, who sang "God Bless America". Miss Nold was accompanied by pianist Jennifer Troiano, the PHS Choir Director.

Commander Starr introduced the Keynote Speaker Navy Captain (ret.) George K. Busse. After graduating from Vanderbilt University Commander Busse was commissioned as an Ensign and served eight years on active duty after which he joined the naval reserve. He retired in 2006 after 30 years of service. He currently holds the position of Elk Grove Township Supervisor and serves on several corporate and charitable boards.

Commander Busse began his address with a visual aid – a US One Dollar bill – and referred the audience to the two circles on the reverse side of the bill. He pointed out that these circles are the front and back of the US National Seal. The circle with the eagle, he noted, is the same symbol that appears at the entrance of all federal buildings. As an aside, he said that when designation of our national symbols was debated by the founding fathers many years ago, none other than Benjamin Franklin suggested that, rather than the Bald Eagle, the symbol should be the Wild Turkey. Commander Busse said that he was happy that Mr. Franklin's suggestion was rejected because the eagle is much more appropriate symbol of our country's strength. Looking at the eagle he noted that the left talon holds the well-known symbol for peace, the olive branch. The eagle's head is turned in that direction to show our country's preference for peace. But sometimes, he said, we must fight for our peace and freedoms -- that is shown by the arrows held in the right talon. Veterans are our nation's eagles he said. They prefer peace but will fight if necessary. Commander Busse said that throughout his naval career he has known many, many veterans. They come from all parts of the country, from many religious and cultural backgrounds and have many different skin colors. But, he said they all have three common traits. First is bravery, as evidenced by their well-known courage under fire. Second is their strength, as shown by their willing ness to follow orders that may cause them to be separated from their families and to serve in many foreign lands. Third is their loyalty because, as they have demonstrated over and over again, while in uniform, the needs of their country comes before them and their personal safety.

Ms. Nold then returned to the stage to sing "America the Beautiful." Following that, in a prerecorded performance, the Joint Color Guard of both Posts honored all veterans with the traditional 21-Gun Salute. The final patriotic musical selection of the day was an outstanding performance of a special Veteran's Day number, "Freedom Finale", by the MacArthur Middle School Orchestra and Band. This was followed by the traditional playing of "Taps" by bugler Ryan Mullen, a talented student at Prospect HS.

Before closing the program, Commander Starr took a moment to recognize and appreciate the mothers & fathers, wives & husbands and all family members of our veterans who served in combat zones overseas. They were the ones who waited, agonized over and prayed for the safe return of their loved ones and from whom came the biggest sigh of relief when they did. Pastor Russ Bechtold, the Mount Prospect Fire Department Chaplain, gave the closing prayer.

On behalf of Mount Prospect's veterans, Commander Starr expressed his thanks and appreciation to the attendees and the staffs of the Village, the Mt. Prospect Park District and the school districts whose dedication and hard work made this year's Veteran's Day program such a great success.
