STATE COMMANDER'S CORNER

Comrades and Auxiliary Members,

The strength of our VFW has always come from our willingness to adapt, to grow, and to support one another in service. We often say that the only bad idea is the one never shared – and that speaks directly to leadership. History teaches us a simple truth: leaders who do not listen rarely succeed.

If our Posts are to remain strong in the years ahead, we must be willing to take an honest look at how we operate and how we prepare for the future. A key part of that future is recruiting and retaining younger Veterans. Without them, we cannot sustain the numbers or the vitality we once enjoyed. That means more than signing up new members; it means listening to their ideas, mentoring them, and giving them real opportunities to lead. It also means making sure that every Veteran who is willing to work is welcomed and empowered to do so.

A powerful lesson in leadership and inclusion can be found in the story of the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion – the “Six Triple Eight.” This unit, the only all-Black, all-female U.S. Army unit to serve overseas during World War II, was given a daunting task: clear years of backlogged mail for soldiers fighting in Europe. Their motto was simple – “No Mail, Low Morale.” Working around the clock and overcoming discrimination and difficult conditions, 855 women sorted and delivered millions of pieces of mail, restoring morale for troops and completing their mission ahead of schedule. Their service was finally recognized with the Congressional Gold Medal.

One of those women was Ruth Ellen Lewis Marshall, a proud member of Benjamin O. Davis VFW Post 311, with Comrade Wallace Braswell serving as her power of attorney. Comrade Marshall transitioned in December 2025. With her passing, we lost more than a comrade – we lost a living piece of history. Her life reminds us that leadership is often quiet and steady: identifying a problem, staying focused on the mission, and lifting morale even in the face of obstacles.

The story of these remarkable women is now reaching a wider audience through The Six Triple Eight movie, currently streaming on Netflix. It tells how these women, despite discrimination and the challenges of war, sorted more than 17 million pieces of mail and ensured that no soldier felt forgotten.

As we remember Comrade Marshall and the legacy of the Six Triple Eight, let us recommit ourselves to building a VFW that truly reflects those values—listening to one another, welcoming all Veterans regardless of age, gender, or background, and preparing the next generation to lead. That is how we honor the past and ensure a strong future for our organization.

National Judge Advocate General Ronald "Ron" Rusakiewicz will represent the national organization during the Department of Illinois Veterans of Foreign Wars Mid-Winter Conference and Voice of Democracy banquet Feb. 5-8 in Springfield.

Rusakiewicz was elected National Judge Advocate General of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the U.S. on Aug. 13, at the 126th VFW National Convention in Columbus, Ohio.

Ron served in the U.S. Army from 1963 to 1966, with the 101st Airborne Division, earning his VFW eligibility serving in Vietnam. In recognition of his service, he received the Good Conduct Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Vietnam Service Medal with bronze service star, Republic of Vietnam Campaign Ribbon with Device, Presidential Unit Citation, Valorous Unit Award, Meritorious Unit Commendation,

Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross with Palm Unit Citation, and the Combat Infantry Badge, among numerous other ribbons and awards.

He joined the VFW in 1967 at Post 9460 in Stratford, Connecticut, where he maintains his Gold Legacy Life membership.

Ron has served

in several elected and appointed positions at the Post, District and Department levels, culminating with his election as the VFW Department of Connecticut Commander from 1991 to 1992, in which he earned the distinction of All-American status. On the national level he has served as Vice Chairman and Chairman of the Legislative and POW-MIA Committees, has served on the Veterans Service Resolutions Committee, the National Council of Administration, and has served numerous terms on the National By-Laws, Manual of Procedure and Ritual Committee. Ron was also elected National Judge Advocate General at the 122nd VFW National Convention in Kansas City, Missouri, serving from 2021 to 2022.

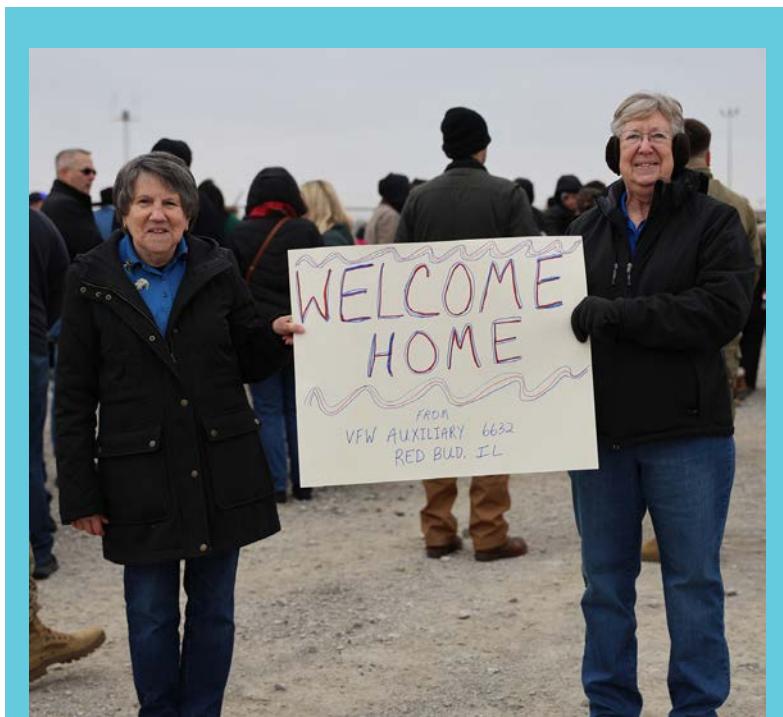

The Illinois Association of County Officials (IACO) has named Seth E. Floyd, Piatt County Circuit Clerk, as the 2025 Illinois County Official of the Year. Floyd received the association's highest honor for leadership and service in county government at the IACO 2025 Fall Conference in Normal, Illinois.

Since his initial election in 2018, Floyd has led significant operational and technological improvements within the Piatt County. These efforts have expanded public access to court services through a redesigned website, a user-friendly mobile app, and a modern digital courthouse display system resulted in savings in upwards of \$600,000 for Piatt County. Beyond his official role, he serves as President of the Piatt County Veterans Assistance Commission, President of the Illinois Association of Court Clerks, and President of the City of Monticello Police and Fire Merit Commission. He also participates in several Illinois Supreme Court and statewide committees.

A lifelong central Illinois resident and U.S. Army Veteran, Floyd has served as Post Commander of Piatt County VFW Post 5346 since 2018. Under his leadership, the Post has earned All-State and All-American Post honors for six consecutive years.

Local Schools and Organizations Honor Mount Prospect Veterans

The 11th Day of November each year has been designated as a day to salute the nation's veterans. 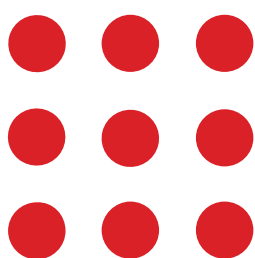

About 160 Soldiers of the Illinois Army National Guard's Machesney Park-based 725th Transportation Company celebrated a deployment to U.S. European Command in which the unit completed more than 93 real-world missions, supported two major multinational exercises, and delivered more than 2.1 million gallons of fuel – all the while making personal and professional improvements in themselves.

Maj. Gen. Rodney Boyd, The Adjutant General of Illinois and Commander of the Illinois National Guard, lauded the unit's Soldiers for their superior performance during the deployment, which lasted from October 2024 to September 2025.

Reorganized and redesignated Oct. 1, 2018, from Alpha Company, 405th BSB to the 725th Transportation Company.

From January 26, 2021, through March 31, 2021, the 725th Transportation Company was mobilized to support Operation Capital Response II in Washington D.C.

In 2023, the unit was awarded Runner Up for the prestigious Army Award for Maintenance Excellence (AAME) in the Army National Guard Medium MTOE category.

District 6 Commander Rob Bland introduced the VFW Past Commander, Tom Cleland. Tom was chosen for his mentoring of the District Commander and his service to the District. He has an impressive bio that was read.

Tom was drafted into the U.S. Army on Jan. 6, 1969, in

Belvidere. He completed Basic Combat Training at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, and Advanced Infantry Training at Fort Ord, California. He was then selected to attend Non-Commissioned Officers Candidate School at Fort Benning, Georgia. After successfully completing NCO School and then Jump School, he was assigned to Fort Polk, Louisiana, for on the job training to complete his NCO School training.

Tom then received orders for Vietnam, where he was assigned to Charlie Company, 2nd Battalion, 327th Infantry, 101st Airborne Division, serving

as an Infantry squad leader.

During his service, Tom earned and was awarded the Combat Infantryman Badge, Parachute Wings, Expert Marksmanship Badge – M14 & M16, the Bronze Star, Army Commendation Medal, Good Conduct Medal, Vietnam Service Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal, and National Defense Service Medal.

Upon his discharge from the US Army, Tom returned to his civilian occupations which included employment at Sundstrand Aviation, Ingersoll Milling Machine Company and retiring from the Illinois Department of Agriculture as a Meat and Poultry Inspector in 2014.

Tom joined Roscoe Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 2955 in 1990, serving as Junior Vice, Senior Vice, and then three



terms as Post Commander from 1994 – 1997. He has also served his Post as a member of the Board of Directors and the Color Guard for 35 years, as Voice of Democracy/Patriot's Pen Chairman for 30 years and as Post Adjutant for 20 years.

From 2000 – 2001, Tom served as the VFW District 6 Commander. Since then, he has served District 6 as Patriot's Pen Chairman from 2008 – 2014, as Voice of Democracy Chairman from 2014 to the present, and as District Adjutant from 2014 until the present.

At the State and National levels, Tom was appointed National Aide-de-Camp in 2008, and Assistant Inspector General in 2010. He has also served as a member of the State Poppy Display Committee since 2018.

In 2019, he received the Congressional Veterans' Commendation from then U.S. Representative Adam Kinzinger.

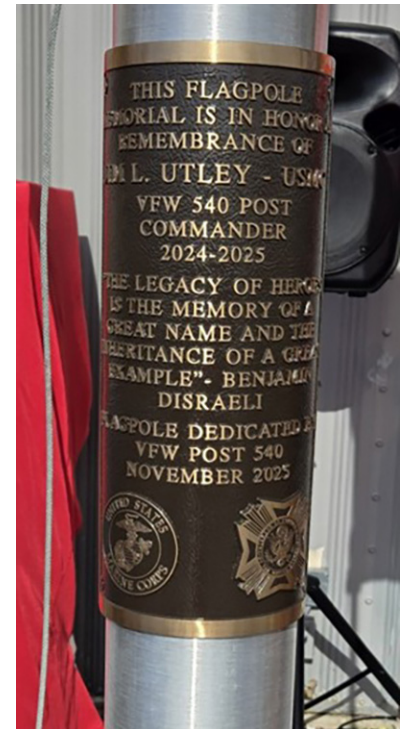

District 16 Posts Collect Groceries for Otto Square Veteran Housing

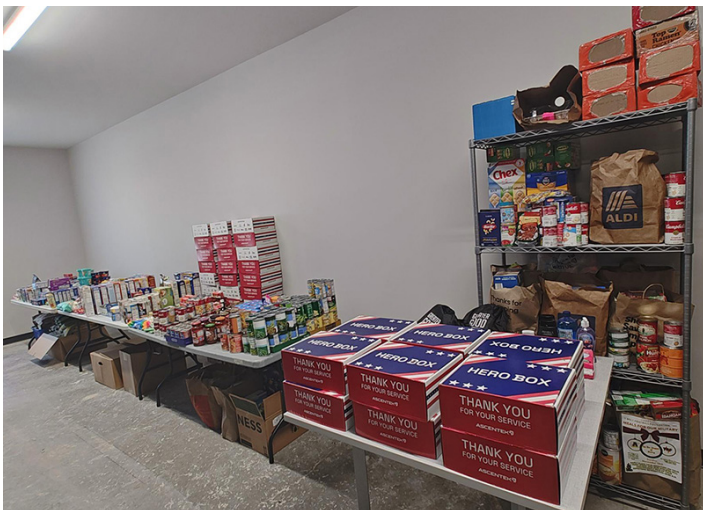
Several posts in District 16 collected groceries for the Otto Square Veteran housing on Nov. 7.

A Purple Heart recipient and life member of Jerry Celletti Post 5418 in Rock Falls was promoted to the rank of colonel in a ceremony Dec. 5 at the Illinois Military Academy on Camp Lincoln, Springfield.

"This moment is all too surreal for me," said Lt. Col. Michael Barton, the Illinois Army National Guard's Military Personnel Officer, while thanking his family for their support. "Thank you to my family for all your love, support, and faithful understanding that although you didn't volunteer to serve because I voluntold you, but nonetheless you had to bear the same uncertainty and struggles my 29 years of service have through at you."

Barton enlisted in the Illinois Army National Guard in 1996 as a Heavy Wheel Vehicle Mechanic assigned to the 1644th Transportation Company in Rock Falls. He attained the rank of staff sergeant before receiving a direct commission in 2006. Throughout his career he has served in multiple command and staff positions including Commander, 1644th Transportation Company; Commander of the 232nd Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, and executive officer, 34th Division Sustainment Brigade.

"Thank you to Kelly, Myleigh, Rhett, Bryer, and Scarlett, and the rest of the Barton family, for taking part in this momentous occasion," said Brig. Gen. Lenny Williams,

Assistant Adjutant General – Army and Commander of the Illinois Army National Guard. "You have a lot to be proud of in the service and accomplishments of literally one of the best officers I have served with."

Williams said three things come to mind when describing Barton.

"Mike always places our Soldiers and their families

above himself," Williams said. "He is genuine. He is the same officer around junior enlisted Soldiers as he is our senior leaders. He does not change character based on the audience. He is true to himself as a leader because his number one priority is always our people."

"Some officers are proficient at both leadership and staff assignments," Williams said.

"Some are great at one or the other. The select few are great at both. Mike is that breed of officer. Mike, you continue being you because our people deserve great leadership."

Barton said his time at the 1644th is the reason behind 29 years of service.

"My time there made me want to keep wearing the uniform," he said. "It made me want to be a better Soldier and it taught me how to be a leader."

He said he is truly grateful for the noncommissioned officers he served with, both as an enlisted Soldier and as an officer.

"The NCO Corps is the best and will always be anchored in my heart," he said. "I've always said an NCO will be present at one hundred percent of training events or combat missions."

Barton also thanked civilian employees.

"You all bring so much to bear which enables the success of the Illinois National Guard," he said. "Without you what we do isn't possible."

Barton said leaders don't get to decide their legacy in the organization.

"I don't get to decide my legacy," he said. "Those I served with or led along the way decide my legacy. I try to be a humble servant who got the people part right. I haven't always gotten the people part right, but I've tried to every day."

Barton credits his faith as his guiding light.

"From everyone who has been given much, much will be required," he said. "From

the one who has been entrusted much, more will be expected. Basically, if we're given blessings, we're expected to be servant leaders and serve others."

Barton said no one makes it to this point in their career without making mistakes and without receiving multiple chances.

"As leaders we all need to remember that in our approach with Soldiers," he said. "It's my ultimate responsibility to see them succeed. Success of the individual leads to the success of the team, squad, platoon, company, battalion, command, state, and ultimately our nation."

He said leaders are entrusted with the nation's greatest resources and that's its people.

"They are the sons and daughters of the United States of America. Employ them, empower them, and hold them accountable, when necessary," he said. "Do so however while giving your Soldiers the model of a firm, fair, and consistent leader."

Barton urged fellow Soldiers to train to standards.

"The standard you walk by is the standard you set," he said. "Don't cut corners in training. If you cut corners in training, you may be inclined to cut corners in your greatest moment of need," he said.

"Don't let cutting corners lead to a Soldier's worst day in the Army."

Barton said whether Soldiers realize it or not, they are ambassadors.

"You may not have wanted to be an ambassador, but you are," he said. "As soon as you raised your right hand, you said I want to be an ambassador. You are an ambassador to the United States, to the U.S. Army, to the unit you serve, and lastly your name. Go out and do the right thing. Take care of yourself and your troops."
